Yukon Seeks Improvements and Additions

It's a difficult job maintaining a fleet this large, not to mention the logistics involved in getting them from one spot to another and picking up all our children. It takes a lot of thought and hard labor to provide busing.

Jeff says our fleet is one of the best around for schools our size. That's a source of pride. Be sure to get out and vote for these bond issues on October 11th.

On Tuesday, October 11th voters will go to the polls and vote on the Yukon School District Bond Issue. The \$9,100,000 bond issue will add upgrades and improvements to existing structures, plus purchase needed books, technology, and reference material without raising taxes.

Voters are asked to approve \$302,000 for library books and reference materials at each school library; \$755,000 for computer software and hardware over the next four years; \$3,536,000 for additional classrooms at Surrey Hills Elementary and for district-wide Early Childhood/Pre-K and Kindergarten

space.

Also, \$350,000 will go toward an additional animal science classroom facility for live animal projects and grooming; \$735,000 to provide instructional equipment at each school, \$200,000 to replace carpet and tile at the high school, and \$1,772,000 for roof repairs, heat/air conditioning upgrades, mowing equipment. Also, \$50,000 will go to improve kitchen equipment, \$900,000 to replace school buses and vans, and \$500,000 to supplement state allocation to provide textbooks throughout the school district. Please vote yes for Yukon schools. ●

Mustang Calls for Bond Issue Vote Oct. 11

Mustang voters will be asked to approve two bond issue totaling \$13 million on Tuesday, October 11th.

The funds include the building of a brand new elementary school at 700 S. Czech Hall Road. Also there will be a softball and soccer locker facility built at the high school, construction of a new vocational-agricultural facility and the purchase of maintenance vehicles and equipment.

Also, the bond will allow the district to buy instruments for the band program, provide electrical improvements and HVAC equipment at the high school, the mid-high and Mustang Middle School.

There will be construction and renovation

of the district warehouse and district administration office. There will be pavement repair at two elementaries and Mustang North Middle School.

A second proposition will be asked for to pay for passenger buses, a vo-ag truck and a passenger van. ●

Delmar's Still Offers Full-Service Fill-Ups

Pumping gasoline for over 40 years could make a man of 74 years quite combustible, but Delmar Daniels seems to remain pretty level-headed through all the changes he's seen in the petroleum industry.

"When I worked for my brother-in-law Elmer Lee at Kimball's gas station in the 1960s the cheapest I saw gas was 13 cents a gallon, during a price war," said Delmar from behind his counter. "Prices will never get to that point again, but they are going down, thanks to the refineries getting back up and running, foreign countries shipping us oil, and the President releasing oil reserves.

"We're a full-service gas station. We'll still clean your windshield or check your tires or whatever. We also have a shop where we repair tires and do some mechanical work. I don't know how many gas stations still have full service, and there

aren't too many left who do any kind of repair work.

"It's tough to make money with a gas station. In fact, you're lucky if you can break even. We sell cigarettes, beer and candy inside. We also sell propane if you have a container. But when gas prices are high, we have to buy high, then if the prices go down, we have to sell low, so we lose money. People might think

we're getting rich with the high price of gasoline, but the gas station owners aren't. Our profit margin is 8 to 10 cents a gallon, but if someone uses a credit card, then that margin goes way down, because of the processing fees involved.

"For each gallon of gas there is 35 cents tax on it. The federal government gets 18 cents and the state 17. For diesel it's \$.38 with

24.4 going to the federal and 14 cents to the state."

"We also race some horses at Remington Park. We run Sleuce Robber and Comes A Man Now, who has set two track records. Our jockey is Benny Landeros of Yukon. We run 4 or 5 horses and have been doing pretty well.

Delmar's hours are 6 am to 6 pm and closed Sunday. ●
